Subject Vocabulary

Pentecost	The Christian festival celebrating the coming of the Holy Spirit on the disciples of Jesus after his Ascension, held on the seventh Sunday after Easter.
Impact	A marked effect or influence
Kingdom	A country, state, or territory ruled by a king or queen. A land that is under the control of a particular person or thing.
Holy Spirit	(in Christianity) the third person of the Trinity; God's spirit active in the world.
Disciples	a personal follower of Christ during his life, especially one of the twelve Apostles. (believers, 'champions' or advocates)
Ascension	the action of rising to an important position or a higher level. Christ went up to heaven on the fortieth day after the Resurrection.

Prior Knowledge:

Pupils will Know that:

The Big Story of the Bible and The Big Frieze. Where the events on and after Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection are placed in 'The Big Story' and 'The Big Frieze'
